



## NCC Prop Recommendations

Prop #	Description	Please Vote	Why
30	<b>Temporary Taxes to Fund Education</b> – Increases personal income tax on annual earnings over \$250,000 for 7 years, increases sales and use tax by 1/4 cent for 4 years. Jerry Brown Initiative. OC from 7.75% to 8% sales tax; LA from 8.75% to 9%. A \$40+ Billion tax increase.	<b>NO</b> <b>A job killer</b>	Raises up to <b>8.5 B per year</b> in taxes rather than cut government waste or encourage more effective solutions
31	<b>State Budget. State and Local Government. Initiative</b> – Establishes 2-year state budget cycle; prohibits Legislature from creating expenditures of more than \$25M unless offsetting revenues or making cuts; permits Governor to cut budget unilaterally during fiscal emergencies if Legislature fails to act; requires performance reviews of all state programs; requires performance goals in state and local budgets; requires publication of all bills at least 3 days prior to legislative vote.	NO (sounds good BUT don't be fooled)	Adds an extra layer of government - Un-elected regional committees and funnels \$200 million state tax dollars into them. <b>Please notice they don't mention this in the summary!</b>
32	<b>Restricts union political fundraising by prohibiting use of payroll deducted funds for political purposes</b> – Same restrictions would apply to payroll deductions, if any, by corporations or government contractors, permits voluntary employee contributions to employer or union committees if authorized yearly, in writing; prohibits unions and corporations from contributing directly or indirectly to candidates and candidate-controlled committees; limits government contractor contributions to elected officers.	<b>YES</b>	<b>Can do for California what Scott Walker did for Wisconsin – stop pension abuse, balance state and city budgets, and create jobs. Encourages politicians to respond to the needs of the people not the special interest.</b>
33	<b>Changes Law to Allow Insurance Companies to Set Prices Based on a Driver's History of Insurance Coverage</b> – Changes current law to allow insurance companies to set prices based on whether the driver previously carried auto insurance with any insurance company. Allows proportional discount for drivers with some prior coverage. Allows increased cost for drivers without history of continuous coverage exempting lapse due to military service or loss of employment.	<b>YES/NO</b> <b>We report, you decide</b>	Crony Capitalism or Free Market Solution? Tea party groups and members, including members of NCC, TCTP, Fallbrook and the GOP are split on this measure. No unanimous decision. You choose.
34	<b>Death Penalty Repeal</b> – Repeals death penalty as maximum punishment for persons found guilty of murder and replaces it with life imprisonment without possibility of parole. Directs \$100 million to law enforcement agencies for investigations of homicide and rape cases. Applies retroactively to persons already sentenced to death.	<b>NO</b>	Repeals the Death Penalty a \$65M annual cost Of the 725 on death row, only 7 have exhausted appeals! What's wrong with the death penalty is our legal system not the death penalty itself.
35	<b>Human Trafficking</b> – Increases prison sentences (up to 15 yrs. to life) and fines (up to \$1.5M) for human trafficking convictions. Requires convicted human traffickers to register as sex offenders. Requires registered sex offenders to disclose Internet identities and activities. Fines collected to be used for victim services and law enforcement training.	<b>YES</b>	Stop Human Trafficking – Makes it less lucrative to enslave women and juveniles
36	<b>Three Strikes Law and Sentencing for Repeat Felony Offenders</b> – Revises three strikes law to impose life sentence only when <i>new</i> felony conviction is serious or violent. Authorizes re-sentencing for offenders currently servicing life sentences if third strike conviction was not serious or violent and judge determines sentence does not pose unreasonable risk to public safety. Maintains life sentence penalty for felons with non-serious, non-violent third strike if prior convictions were for rape, murder, or child molestation	<b>NO</b>	Sorry We don't trust the judges.  Your NO vote will keep the law as is and will continue to protect citizens from violent criminals and <b>potential</b> violent crimes and criminals.
37	<b>Genetically Engineered Foods, Mandatory Labeling</b> - Requires labeling of food if made from plants or animals with genetic material changed in	<b>NO</b>	Exemptions provided create the opportunity for politicians to

38	<b>Tax for Education and Early Childhood Programs</b> - Increases personal income tax on a sliding scale for 12 years. Revenues go to K–12 schools and early childhood programs, and for four years to repaying state debt. <b>\$132 Billion tax increase.</b>	<b>NO</b> A Job Killer	Raises taxes rather than cut government waste or encourage more effective solutions
39	<b>Tax Treatment for Multi-State Businesses, Clean Energy/Efficiency Funding</b> – Increases taxes for multi-state corporations. Dedicates revenues for five years to clean/efficient energy projects. May reduce jobs in CA and cause more business flight from CA.	<b>NO</b> A Job Killer	Promotes crony capitalism – Solyndra was a clean energy project
40	<b>Redistricting State Senate Districts</b> – A “Yes” vote approves, a “No” vote rejects, new State Senate districts drawn by the Citizens Redistricting Commission. If rejected, districts will be adjusted by officials supervised by the California Supreme Court.	<b>NO</b>	There has been too much flip-flopping by the GOP on this issue. It should be shelved until next election cycle to be written with Constitutional clarity.

**Knowing the Players**

A follow-the-money analysis has 3 donor categories: small businesses, public employees, and big businesses.

- Small businesses create 65% of US jobs. They need *decreased* regulations and *lower* taxes so the customer has more money to spend.
- Public employees want higher taxes so their raises depend on it. Already their pay is 44% higher than their private sector counterpart.
- Big business tends to buy influence or protection.
